If a student is found to be responsible for a policy violation, or for attempting to violate or assisting in the of a policy, sanctions will be imposed. Appropriate sanctions will be determined based on the specific facts case, the studentevel of inte (t)0.7 (e)-t

Sanction Definitions

Alcohol Policy Violations

Rule #1 Consumption, possession or purchase of alcoholic beverages by any person less than the minimum age allowed by law.

Possession, personal use or purchasing of marijuana, controlled substances, prescription drugs prescribed to another person, illegal drugs; or possession of drug paraphernalia containing drug residue.

Rule #5

Distribution of controlled substances, prescription drugs prescribed to another person or illegal drugs.

Federal and state laws control the possession, use and sale of drugs and include penalties for violations. Eluniversity prohibits the illegal possession or distribution of any illicit drug so defined under state or federative views the use, possession, or sale of any illicit drug as contradictory to the welfare of both the individual campus community. The harmful effects of drug abuse on physical and mental health are well established, costs of such actions both academically and legally.

It is critical that all members of the community understand and anticipate the University's response to incommunity use, possession, transfer, distribution and trafficking in illicit drugs or the attempt, solicitation, of to commit any such offenses. Action taken by the University in all cases of drug violations will be guided to both for the welfare of the personnel and for the maintenance of a suitable educational environment for all members of the campus community. The University is not a law enforcement agency and does not assess specified in state and federal laws. Adjudication of violations of the drug policy, however, may reflect current and legal standards related to different classes of illicit drugs. Additionally, the University will cooperate we state and federal authorities.
